



# Why Should Children Read & Practice Math Over the Summer?

- Students can experience "The Summer Slide."
- By the end of grade 6, students who have experienced summer learning loss over the years are an average of 2 years behind their peers.
- When the child falls behind, it causes anxiety.
- A lack of fact fluency holds a child back with problem-solving, algebra and other higher order math concepts.

# But, wait!

According to the research, math skills are more likely to be lost over the summer than reading skills!

# Why is Practicing so Important?


- Younger children are prone to the most learning loss because they're at a crucial stage in their development.
- In general, kids learn a lot more in kindergarten, first grade, and second grade than kids in middle school or high school learning follows a curve where it's accelerated early in life and then plateaus.


# Why Does Math Slide?


Families are more likely to read bedtime stories at night and not as likely to practice math facts at bedtime








### Bedtime Math Website: Today's Fun Math

Read short math stories together. Studies have shown that reading math-focused stories to children, such as Bedtime Math books or the Family Math series, can help boost math scores in school.











# Math Games

Many games rely on math skills such as counting and categorizing. Even things like playing with blocks and playing with jigsaw puzzles can help kids learn spatial skills and recognize patterns.

## **Math Ideas for Summer**

### (or Anytime)

- Sidewalk chalk for math problems or drawing pictures to solve problems
- Make math problems in the sand.
- Magnetic numbers, shaving cream, Play-Doh!
- Counting: skip counting, count items, count steps.
- Give a child an answer and have them come up with a math problem.
- Collect coins in a jar: sort them into groups. Discuss their names and values. Count the money.
- Measure! How tall are you, how far can you jump?
- Write down all the important dates on a calendar: your birthday, special holidays, upcoming trips. Make a countdown to an event.
- Time: How long does it take to do something, use a stopwatch (ie. Get to the beach, brush your teeth, jump up and down 10 times)






- 1. The value placed on literacy in the home.


