#### "Fidget Spinners" Take Over CPS

As the new year began, so had many new trends, including the fidget spinner. The fidget spinner is a three pronged device, intended to be spun between fingertips, made for kids with ADHD, anxiety, and autism to help them focus and relieve stress, but now they have become a fad among all age groups.

According to the New York Times article "How Fidget Spinners Became a Hula Hoop for Generation Z," the fidget spinner was originally created by Catherine Hettinger, an inventor in Florida, and the toy has become very popular in schools world wide. The idea for the spinner started one day when Hettinger was trying to think of a way to bond with her daughter who had myasthenia gravis, a medical condition caused by a breakdown in

communication between nerves and muscles. Hettinger had tried to popularize her invention, but Hasbro declined to market it. Since then, small manufacturers have begun to release different variations of the spinner for kids with ADHD, anxiety, etc.

Since the toy has become more popular since it was created in 1997, many kids have invested in the toy not only for concentration, but as a form of

entertainment. Fidget spinners are sold on Amazon for anywhere from \$1-\$15, and in some malls they can be up to \$40.

The toy has caused lots of drama in schools around the country, and even in our own. In school, many teachers have seen this toy as a problem that distracts students from paying attention. Using the spinner every once in awhile can keep students focused, but our principal Dr. Cohen states that they "help some students, and they distract others."

As the school year has progressed Dr. Cohen, and some students, have noticed that fidget spinners have become more and more popular. Dr. Cohen believes it is because "as kids start seeing other kids with them they say 'Oh that looks good, and they're cool, I'm going to get one of those'. So I think it, just like with anything

#### Schedule Changes Next Year

Next year, all middle school grades will experience a massive schedule change. The schedule changes features things such as no advisory in the morning, and a different daily rotation.

After students congregate in the lobby at 7:45, seventh and eighth graders will head straight to their first Encore. Sixth graders will go to their first Core class. Instead of advisory in the morning, there will be half hour blocks on Monday Wednesdays, and Fridays second to last block of the day. "During Advisory there will be activities planned by your advisory teacher. They will feature team building exercises and character development activities," explained Dr. Cohen.

There will also be WIN/WIN time on Tuesdays and Thursdays during last block. WIN/WIN stands for Who I Need/What I Need. "For the Tuesday and Thursday groupings, the grade levels teachers will meet as a team to decide if students need intervention or extension in the Core classes," Mrs. Hickman added.

There will be 27 different advisories. Similar to last year, each lighthouse team will be assigned advisories, nine for each. The difference next year is that each advisory will have kids from grade levels 6, 7, and 8. There will be four sixth graders, four seventh graders, and four eighth graders per teacher.

that becomes popular, more and more people start getting them, and that lead to more people being interested in having their own."

Having fidgets spinners out during class can cause some students to become unfocused, but it can also affect the other people around them if they are not using them appropriately. 8th grade Oceanography teacher Mrs. Bardsley allows students to use fidget spinners in her class as long as "they are not a distraction and students know how to use them in a way that is effective to help them concentrate more." When people aren't using them for what they are intended for, or they are being distracting it can cause an issue.

From a student's perspective, fidget spinners can be seen very differently. 8th grader Conner Rice does think that they help with concentration, but at the same time they are fun to use. He says "I feel like it helps them (students). It helps them to be constantly moving but it's also very quiet." On the other hand, 8th grader Reese Burns has noticed that students with fidget spinners, including her brother, have been more distracted by the toy. "I personally think that while they are used to help students concentrate, they are more focused on the fidget spinner causing them to be distracted. I have noticed that by seeing how my brother uses his own, like he is in a whole other world just spinning and doing tricks over and over again."

Even though the fidget spinner was originally intended to help people with ADHD, autism, and anxiety, concentrate, they have caused trouble throughout schools. Many schools have disagreed with them, and even in our own school not everyone agrees with them, but they have benefited people and are a fun, alternative way to help with concentration.

"On average, middle-income students experience slight gains in reading performance during summer vacation. Low-income students experience about two month loss in achievement," according to the Bright Hub Education website. Bright Hub Education further explains, students miss out on reading over the summer, studies have shown that teachers spend about 4-6 weeks on reteaching material that students had lost over summer....Low-income children, by the end of fifth grade, are about 2.5 years behind their more affluent peers. This is primarily due to summer learning loss." Although not everyone likes to read over the summer, there can be some consequences to missing out on picking up your book over summer vacation.



Cyrus Peirce Middle School (CPS) and Nantucket High School (NHS) are encouraging students to read over summer. Both schools have piggybacked on the Nantucket Atheneum's program One Book, One Island. This will be the third year CPS has taken part in the program. The high school has decided to follow suit this year. On the Same Page @ CPS and One Book, One School (NHS) is when the whole school reads the same book over the summer. When the students come back in September, they will meet with a teacher in small groups to discuss the books.

Cyrus Peirce has done the one book school-wide read for a few years. CPS students and faculty like to claim that we are all "On the Same Page at CPS." This year the whole middle school will be reading *The Thing About Jellyfish* by Ali Benjamin. The students will also be reading another book that they will choose from a list of over 50 titles. Ms. Sullivan, the CPS/NHS Librarian, has an important role with the summer reading. She organizes the summer reading program for both schools.


Once the students come back in fall there will be book groups. Mrs. Hickman, previous (soon to be returning) sixth grade English teacher explained, "Mr. Davis, Mrs. Lombardi, Mrs. Macvicar and I decided that we wanted to change the program. I think that Mrs. Lombardi had the idea of reading one book." Three years ago, the four teachers worked together, along with Ms. Sullivan, to change the summer reading program to what it is today.

"We wanted to create a program that really builds more of a community feel around reading, and we chose *Wonder* the first year because of its theme of kindness. We thought that the novel would lend itself nicely to school wide activities," continued Hickman.



#### Jack's Guide To Summer Fishing

If you love to fish, now's the time to get out your rods and head to the beach. Striped Bass usually show up at the island mid April and stay throughout the summer and into early fall while the other species show up later in the season around July and August. Schoolies (smaller bass) come to island first and a few weeks later the bigger fish start to come. Most people see fishing as a way to relax and have fun. Here are some tips that are some real keepers.

The time in day that striped bass feed is at dawn or dusk, these are the best times to head out on the water. By mid July, they usually only hunt at night. There are many different types of rigs and lures you can use, but here are some of my personal favorites. One of my favorite lures is a 3-5 inch paddle tail shad or a curly tail with ¾ ounces jig

head. Another favorite are Slug-go's or shell bombers. Shell bomber lures are commonly topwater lures, while bait such as clams and other rigs are used for bottom/deeper waters. The best lures for early summer are soft baits such as paddle tails or Joppa jigs.

Some of my favorite spots for Striped Bass and other species consist of Eel Point, Madaket Harbor, Great Point, and Smith's Point. At Great Point, you would want to use deeper water lures such as Soft Rubber Jigs. Over in Eel Point and Madaket Harbor you would want to use topwater lures where the water is shallower. You would want to use something like a shell bomber or live bait, such as eels.

Benitas come to the island later in the season around the beginning of August. Now these fish have specific places they generally hang out, but you can get them off the shore in other places. The Benita Bar is famous for the large amounts Benita that live there. The Benita Bar is about a half mile off the coast of Smith's Point (which is also a great place to catch many species). Unfortunately, the Benita Bar is not possible to get to shore casting, but your chances of catching a fish in Madaket are very high.

Bluefish are one of Nantucket's most common species which start to show up to the island in May and continue to stay until late October. Bluefish are like garbage disposals; they'll eat anything from live bait, hard plastic, swimbaits, or metals rigs. Out of the three most common species for summer time fishing (Striped Bass, Bluefish, and Benita), your odds of catching a Bluefish are the highest. I would suggest using a Big Shot lure.

#### The Great Fire of Nantucket

The day is July 13, 1846, and as average as any other. With the smell of whale oil in the air, the townspeople gathering at the town center, the large fire in the distance growing larger by the second, the whale ships sailing off and returning to the island. Wait, fire?!

Yes, about 170 years ago on that day, The Great Fire of Nantucket Island had completely destroyed one-third of the whole town and set it down to nothing but ashes. This had been the worst disaster that had ever hit the island, in terms of material destruction, that is. The town was also considerably vulnerable to an economic disaster at this time as well.

During 1846, Nantucket was a very prosperous town due to its success in the

whaling industry at that time. The island was booming with a population of roughly 10,000 residents, numerous mansions lining Main Street, and the thousands of whaling ships leaving and returning to the harbor with hundreds of barrels filled with whale oil.

By the mid-1840's, however, overfishing had started to have a negative effect on whaling. With whale ships having to travel even farther out and stay in the same places for a bit longer in order to get more oil. Not to mention that a sandbar across the harbor had prevented the large and heavy-laden ships from entering, which meant that they needed to use ports in places like New Bedford.

Now, according to Yesterday's Island, fires have struck the island several times before 1846. Fires had caused events

such as, a kitchen fire killing 10 people when the Quaise Poor Farm Asylum burned down, blazes destroying one hotel and several stores along Main Street, as well as oil fires and violent winds destroying the Brant Point Lighthouse twice!

Yet, the town still relied on volunteer fire companies, hand-pumpers, and large underground cisterns of water for defense.

It all started in William Geary's hat shop at 11 o'clock at night from a defective stovepipe. And within an hour, the fire had started burning out of control. The next day, one third of the town had been reduced to nothing but ashes, ashes of buildings where the majority of which had been stores, markets, and houses. Thankfully, nobody was killed during the fire, but hundreds

When you walk in, you can see them making the delicious cones and bowls in the back. As soon as you step through the swinging screen doors, you immediately smell the ice cream and cones. You almost feel overwhelmed by all of the people in line, the hundreds of flavors written all across the walls, the music blasting, and the customers and servers singing along.

The Juice Bar opened for the 2017 season during Daffodil Weekend, and it is about their fortieth year being open. The Juice Bar is located at 12 Broad Street, and has always been there. The Juice Bar opened in the late 70s, when the name "Juice Bar" was created. Originally owned by two men (names not known), it was a literal "bar" where you could go and get fresh juices.

Then, Craig (Boris) Pilsnaker and Sally Dukes bought the Juice Bar from the two men, and introduced their home-

made ice cream. In 1999, the current owners, Ron and Jackie Lefebvre, bought the ice cream parlor, and continued with the homemade ice cream.

The Lefebvre's have considered changing the name of the Juice Bar so that they would no longer have to continue with juices. But, as Mr. Lefebvre stated, "Everyone knows it as the 'Juice Bar.'" Therefore, it wouldn't make sense to change the name, it would only be confusing.

The Juice Bar makes their own ice cream. They have one machine in the back to help make the ice cream, but the rest is done by hand. Mr. Lefebvre stated that four to five employees each year help make the ice cream. Many employees that work behind the counter also work as an ice cream maker one to two times a week. Lefebvre says that they do this so that the employees behind the counter know what is in the ice cream, and can answer any questions regarding the ice cream. Some will even come up with new flavors.


This year, the Juice Bar has around 35 employees. Lefebvre says that the requirements of being an employee at the local Juice Bar are "being friendly, being able to work in a fast-paced environment, being friendly, and being consistent with scoop sizes." Many local Nantucket High Schoolers work at the Juice Bar as their summer job, and it is definitely a "sweet" career choice.

#### #3 - Cisco



1/2 CUP FRESHLY GRATED PARMESAN CHEESE
1 CUP FINELY GRATED GRUYÈRE CHEESE
1 TEASPOON MINCED FRESH THYME LEAVES
1 TEASPOON SALT
FRESHLY GROUND BLACK PEPPER

PREHEAT THE OVEN TO 375° ROLL OUT EACH SHEET OF PUFF PASTRY ON A LIGHTLY FLOURED BOARD UNTIL IT'S 10 X 12 INCHES, BEAT EGG WITH 1 TABLESPOON OF WATER AND BRUSH THE SURFACE OF THE PASTRY, SPRINKLE EACH SHEET EVENLY WITH 1/4 CUP OF THE PARMESAN, 1/2 CUP OF THE GRUEYRE, 1/2 TEASPOON OF THE THYME, 1/2 TEASPOON OF THE SALT, AND SOME PEPPER. WITH THE ROLLING PIN, LIGHTLY PRESS THE FLAVORINGS INTO THE PUFF PASTRY. CUT EACH SHEET CROSSWISE WITH A FLOURED KNIFE OR PIZZA WHEEL INTO 11 OR 12 STRIPS. TWIST EACH STRIP AND LAY ON BAKING SHEETS LINED WITH PARCHMENT PAPER BAKE FOR 10 TO 15 MINUTES, UNTIL LIGHTLY BROWNED AND PUFFED. TURN EACH STRAW AND BAKE FOR ANOTHER 2 MINUTES. DON'T OVER BAKE OR THE CHEESE WILL BURN. COOL AND SERVE AT ROOM TEMPERATURE.

#### Homeless on Nantucket?

Imagine waking up in a parked van realizing that all housing options are gone. This may be common in other parts of the country, but on Nantucket? Unfortunately, due to skyrocketing real estate costs, this is a reality for many year-round islanders. Local residents are the backbone of the community, yet they are the victims of Nantucket's exploding summer population.

The Nantucket housing shuffle (the seasonal relocation of year round residents) has always been a problem, and according to Tucker Holland, a housing consultant working for ReMain Nantucket, it has been a huge problem in the last three years. He also says the selectmen have not been giving this problem the attention it deserves. Historically, housing on Nantucket has not always been such a concern.

However, it is now one of Nantucket's major problems, especially during the summer season. Many of Nantucket's residents must rent on 10-month basis making homelessness over the summer inevitable. There have even been cases of parents sending their children to live off island during the summer recess due to the lack of affordable housing. Moreover, Holland points out that many construction workers commute from Cape Cod because the real estate is too expensive on the island.

According to Housing Nantucket, the island now has a median home price of \$1.2 million, which has left 90% of Nantucket's year round population without a permanent home. Furthermore, to qualify for affordable housing individuals can make up to \$141,000. The median household income on Nantucket is \$86,641 per year.

The crux of Nantucket's housing shortage is two-fold. First of all, Nantucket has become a magnet for mass amounts of wealth. While this is good for the economy it raises real estate prices through the roof. Secondly, conservation organizations have been buying up mass pieces of land to protect See Housing, page 18

Matt Reinemo, owner of Nantucket Tackle Center, reaffirmed my thinking. "I completely agree with some of your lure choices and tactics." He went to say how eels and soft rubber jigs seem to be the most popular throughout the spring and into late summer for Stripers. "The Nantucket Harbor is also a great place for Stripers in late summer because of the deep pockets where the water is cooler," he added.

Chris Cothran, Latin teacher and fellow fishing enthusiast, believes fishing is a great way to relax and get away. "I started to fish really ever since I was old enough to hold a fishing pole. I grew up on a lake and very close to a river. I would say I was probably 3 or 4 when I caught my first fish." explains Cothran. He continued, "I like to fish because it gets me out in nature. I've seen some pretty incredible and beautiful places. It's also a way to tune everything else out: when I go fishing I don't really think about anything else." I also inquired as to what his personal favorite lures are. "When I moved to Nantucket, I had to change to slug-go's and Joppa Jigs to tempt the Striped Bass. But when I was younger and lived

In conclusion there are not many solutions but there are a couple that could make a big difference. Number 1: there could be a housing bank that would work like a land bank. For example, they would collect one percent of the cost on every home purchase to go towards new affordable housing developments. Number 2: there could be tiny house complexes were people could live with their tiny homes. Holland is one for the idea as long as it's under control, and the home owners make sure the properties are maintained so it does not get the vibe of a trailer park. Number 3: there could be deals or special offers on 12 month leases giving yearrounders a chance and reasonable housing. Recently the community has been seeing the serious effect that this problem has been creating but if it is addressed in the right way this problem can be in our rear view mirror.

These three species are the most commonly known and are almost anywhere on the island. By mid June, Stripers will be all over the places as well as Bluefish. I have had my best bets for Bonito around the Madaket area.

The best tide to go fishing is high tide which differs around island. The best time to be out fishing is dawn and dusk.

These are just some basic and helpful tips and now you know more than enough information to get out on the water and reel in those fish.

upon hundreds of people and families were left homeless. Over \$1,000,000 was lost in damage (approximately \$24,000,000 today).

Within days, the island's selectmen had issued out an appeal for aid. After the appeal was sent out, donations had poured in. A steamboat was sent over from Fall River's residents with cash and several thousands of dollars' worth of food and clothing, as well as the citizens of Boston sending over about \$15,000 for the island's aid.

Now, according to MassMoments, while no lives were lost after the whole ordeal, there was one major casualty. During the raging inferno, the flames had made their way over to the Atheneum Library and Museum. The Atheneum had been a very prominent symbol of prosperity and sophistication that was brought to the island during their days in the whaling industry. The Atheneum had also stored old documents, as well as the tools and materials that the whalers had carried back home after their voyages. But as the fire made its way through the Atheneum, it had destroyed these items.

While the fire greatly affected Nantucket's town, the residents were able to rebuild from the ashes.

All students currently on a lighthouse team will remain on the same team. For example, Brant Point students will stay on the Brant Point team. A student's advisor will stay his/her advisor for their whole middle school career.

Dr. Cohen explained that "Older kids can turn into mentors for younger kids, help 6th graders learn the ropes." Dr. Cohen added, "This allows kids from all grades to interact with each other." The schedule rotation will also change. The schedule will rotate from Monday to Friday, rather than Days 1-6. This is because the elementary and high schools run on a 5 day schedule. In previous years, scheduling has been difficult for teachers that teach

throughout the elementary and high schools.

Encore classes will be 50 minute blocks. While all core classes will be 55 minutes. The only class that will be longer is the one after lunch, it has an additional five minutes to allow passing time in the hallways.

All students will learn the same subjects as the year before. Although some teachers will be teaching different grades, as well as different classes. Dr. Cohen stated that, "Technology will become an Encore and some Encores will become after school clubs."


These changes might be really fun to have, although they may take some time to adjust to. Many teachers and students think it's a change for the better.
