Go-Karts or No-Karts?

Potential (BIG) Changes to the Annual 8th Grade Go-Kart races

This year, many big adjustments are being made to the annual eighth grade Go-Kart races. For the past 34 years, the 8th grade has participated in the making of go karts. This race consists of eighth grade students forming teams and building their very own go karts as their last fun activity in the middle school. Over the past 10 years there has been a decline in the amount of students participating, so the eighth grade staff has decided to make some changes to this activity.

After many months, the eighth grade team worked together and came up with some solutions. After conversing, the team created a survey for students asking if they would still participate in the go karts if the staff chose the teams. On the survey some questions included "Would you still participate with these changes?" And "How many of you would still want to do it with the new changes?" They also decided that the go karts would not happen if not every student would participate and if they picked the teams. Although there has

been some changes, some rules have stayed the same. There are still four courses, this includes the "U turn, the "straight away", the "donut", and the "letter Z." Throughout these courses, go karts must have four wheels touching the ground at all times.

The eighth grade team also wants to get the community involved. Doing this would

mean getting volunteers from the community to help build the karts, instead of students going to houses and doing the work. This means all 110 eighth graders must participate and there must be at least 20 parent volunteers that will help each team build their go karts.

Many of the eighth graders were not excited about all the changes, because Go Karts are an eighth grade tradition that students have been looking forward to since entering CPS. Teachers had decided to cancel the Go Karts, but instead they made changes. In addition to teachers picking teams, some other changes to the races include mandatory student participation and mandatory meetings by the teams outside of school.

Ms. Davidson, the eighth grade science teacher, has been helping out with the Go Karts for 21 years. She has been a big part of this activity. Ms. Davidson stated that the main reason why there has been changes to Go Karts this year is because of the decline in student participation. Ms. Davidson had her own opinion on this topic along with all the other eighth grade staff.

"Yes, definitely this has been a priority of of mine for a few years now. My last school had an advisory program and it was a great thing for the school." Next year, expect a new advisory schedule and change.

Advisory may become a mixed class of 6th, 7th, and 8th graders. Putting students from different grades in the same advisory will allow multiple students from each grade to interact and work together. This could be a good thing, and could lead students to learn something new about someone they may have never really talked to or seen before. The truth is, nobody will know the reaction of the students until the school follows through with this idea.

Seventh grader Caroline Correia feels as though the new advisories could "be a

good or bad thing," the "bad thing" being if an advisory only has 8th or 6th graders. Correia also notes the benefits of multigrade advisories, as such may lead students to "make new friends with everybody else, not just kids in [their own] grade."

Dr.Cohen was very proud when saying, "The hope is that once this gets going the 7th and 8th graders can train the 6th graders, along with their teacher. I like it because it will empower students to empower other students." One of the main reasons for multiple grades is that seventh and eighth graders are there to help the sixth graders.

Is advisory too short? Next year, the school might be expanding advisory time to another block during the day. Doing this will leave time to see teachers for help or get work done that is late. This way, teachers know that students have a set time to get extra help and class extensions. Students will spend more time with their advisory teacher and peers in the class, making it more of a comfortable space in the morning be before classes start.

The Women's March

On January 21, 2017 a nonviolent march started. Women, not only across America, but the entire globe, came together and marched for women's rights. There was an estimated 470,000 people that marched at D.C. The march was the largest single-day demonstration in US history. The march took place in several places including Washington, D.C, Atlanta, Georgia, London, England, Paris, France, New York City, and Boston, Massachusetts.

The Women's March joined forces with another nonviolent protest. As part of this protest, women would wear pink hats with cat ears. These two organizations had a mission, to tell the new leader of the United States of America that "Women's rights are human rights," regardless of race, religion, ethnicity, age, immigration status, sexual identity or disability.

Along with the march came a rally. Nationally recognized advocates, entertainers, and other inspired protesters spoke. Gloria Steinem, well-known feminist writer, activist, and organizer, was one of the speakers in DC. In her speech, she thanked many people who were here before her and who

fought for women's rights. Taken from the official transcript of her speech, she said "We are not ranked. And this is a day that will change us forever because we are together. Each of us individually and collectively will never be the same again."

While this march was mostly for women's rights, many protested for other things such as equal pay, immigration reform, healthcare reform, the natural environment, LGBTQ, and Black Lives Matter. There were not only the pink hats that many people wore, but there were also t-shirts with hearts reading "Nasty women", a slam towards newly-elected Trump, based on comments he made about his opponent, Hillary Clinton. Other women carried flags and other signs as symbols of peace and love.

Many people believe that this protest was a success. Only time will tell.

Some people created posters about Donald Trump, saying things like "Not my President." Most of the posters had images of women from all different races. Some

had curly hair, some had headscarves and some showed a painting of a torch with many different skin colored hands holding it. During the march, people chanted things like "Women's rights are human rights."

After everyone returned from the march, women read aloud from the Unity Principles. The Unity Principles are a group of writings that state our human rights, and can be found on the Women's March website. The passages on the website are about not only women's rights, but worker's rights, civil rights, disability rights, immigrant rights and a few others.

Scarlett says they read them because "We felt it was important to share our values." She also states that "the fact that we were able to have the Unity Principles read in both English and Spanish..." was her "favorite part of the event."

After that, the team continued to work hard at practice in preparation for their next competition held in Bourne, MA.

At the beginning of December, there was a show held at the Nantucket Ice Rink for all of the skaters, at all levels, to show off their skills. The coaches and parents agreed that the Annual Christmas Skating Show was a great way for skaters to practice skating in front of an audience.

A week later, both of the teams went to what they consider one of the most exciting competitions of the season, the

A Dog's Purpose



Imagine you're in school and everything is normal, then in the blink of an eye, everyone over the age of 15 vanishes. For Sam Temple, Astrid Ellison, Quinn Gaither and many other Perdido Beach kids, just this happened. Many of them are scared as they have to learn to live on their own, and yet, even without parents, they still make it through the rough times. This amazing novel, Gone, was published in 2008 and is written by Michael Grant. Michael Grant has also written six other books for this series.

Sam, Astrid, and Quinn go through many ups and downs. As they set out to explore an area called the "Fallout Alley Youth Zone" (FAYZ), they start to realize that they are cut off from the outside world. As they are investigating the area around the nuclear power plant, they discover Astrid's brother, the severely autistic, four-year-old Pete, along with a map. Prologue




My Adventure to France

Does Nutella Really Cause Cancer?

Imagine waking up in the morning and making toast. Then from your cupboard, you grab a jar. Just as the toast pops out of the toaster, you unscrew the jar and take out a butter knife. Quickly, you take your toast out of the toaster and placed it on the counter. Afterward, you dip your butter knife into the jar and spread the smooth paste across the toast. You take a bite and it is both chocolatey and creamy, but also crispy from the toast. This is Nutella, a world-loved chocolate hazelnut spread.

In 2014, Nutella celebrated its 50th birthday and it and other Ferrero products are now sold in over 160 countries.

It all began in Piedmont, Italy. During and after World War Two, there was a limited supply of cocoa. Pietro Ferrero, a pastry chef, invented a delicious paste containing hazelnuts, sugar and only a small amount of cocoa. He called it 'Giandujot' and shaped it into a loaf that could be sliced.

On May 14, 1946, he officially founded the Ferrero Company and they made a


The amount of game modes that you're able to play on are very fun. With

This next one is a LIFESAVER.


Hack #3: While giving a presentation for a class, set up one of your friends to

"Totally! I wonder what kind of noise it made?" questioned Evelyn.


"Seriously, that's the question you ask?" replied Amy, her neck and right hand coming forward. "Anyway let's get going home, it'll start to get dark soon."

new and improved product called "SuperCrema" in 1951. In 1964, Ferrero's son, Michele, through trial and error, created the enjoyable, creamy Nutella that countless people still enjoy today.

One day, in January of 2017, I walked into to school to everyone telling me that Nutella causes cancer. I, personally, have always loved the spread and was very skeptical, so I decided I would find out for myself.

The European Food Safety Authority (EFSA) has discovered that when palm oil is heated at temperatures over 393°F, it produces glycidyl fatty acid esters. Glycidyl fatty acid esters are the main cancer worry, as they may promote cancer risks.






